

Surgical Safety Checklist Compliance (SSCC) Case and Rate Public Reporting July - December 2014

What is a surgical safety checklist?

A surgical safety checklist is a patient safety (SSCL) communication tool that is used by a team of operating room professionals (nurses, surgeons, anesthesiologists, and others) to discuss important details about each surgical case. The SSCL helps ensure that important safety steps are followed for each and every operation. It is a final check prior to surgery used to make sure everyone knows the important medical information they need to know about the patient, all equipment is available and in working order, and everyone is ready to proceed.

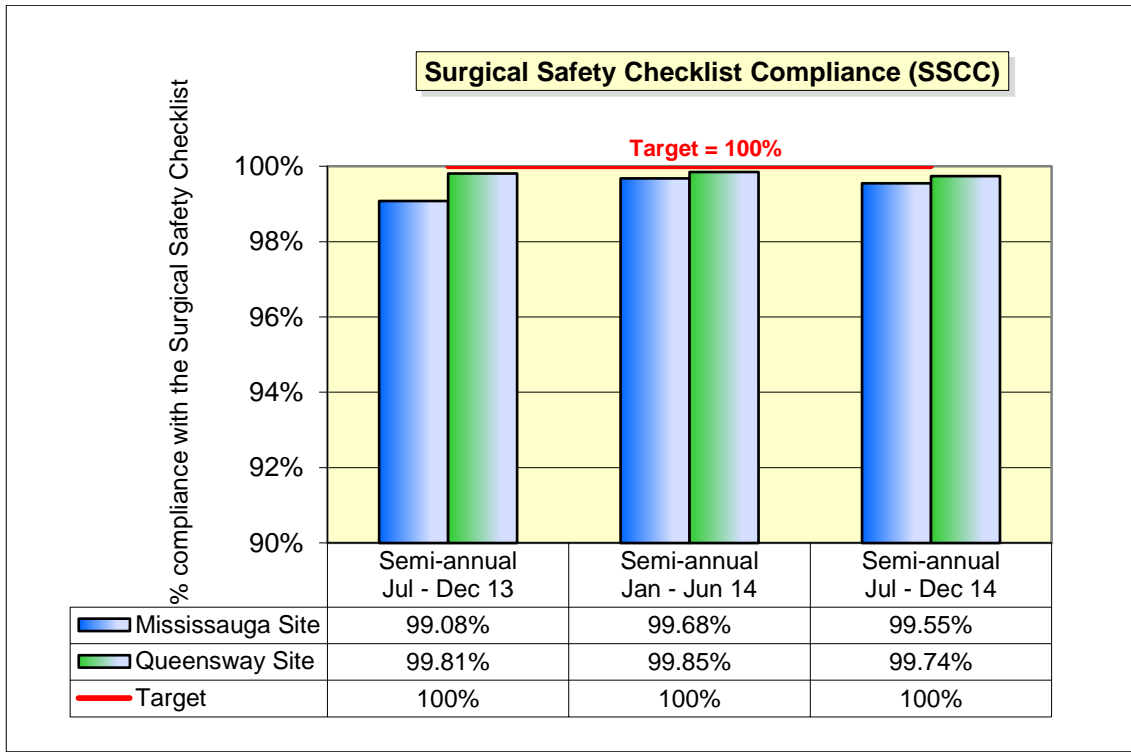
How is the surgical safety checklist rate calculated?

$$\frac{\text{\# of times all three phases of the surgical safety checklist was performed}}{\text{Total \# of surgeries}} \times 100$$

What information is included in a surgical safety checklist?

Some examples of items contained in the checklist include:

The Briefing Phase:

- Verify with patient name and procedure to be done
- Allergy check
- Medications check

The “Time Out” Phase:

- Patient position
- Operation site, side and procedure
- Antibiotics check

The Debriefing Phase:

- Surgeon reviews important items
- Anesthesiologist reviews important items
- Nurse reviews correct counts
